Birdwatching

A hobby that is getting increasingly popular nowadays, birdwatching is the practice of, as its **0** ______ suggests, observing birds. It exists in many forms – **9** ______ simply looking at birds, to identifying them, trying to find rare ones, recognizing them by the **10** ______ they sing and so on. Many bird-watchers keep record **11** ______ the avian species they have seen throughout their birdwatching "careers".

Some people **12** ______ this hobby more seriously than others. It is not rare for a seasoned bird-watcher to travel to a different city or even country to witness a particular bird in **13** ______, as seeing them in a picture is not considered to be a genuine experience. They are also keen to track down bird seasonal migration, observe their interactions with other species. There is also a division between having seen the bird and **14** ______ it sing. There is a generally held idea that the former is more important than the latter.

All of this might sound very complex and, **15** _____, off-putting. However, the activity can be as simple as trying to spot a bird. You can start in your **16** _____ backyard – there is no need to travel half across the globe to truly experience the joy of watching birds!

Answers and explanations

- 9. **From.** The range of possible activities here is introduced through 'from ... to ...' structure. Be careful not to give 'since' as your answer.
- 10. **Way/Manner.** Both nouns are acceptable here. Context is key to understanding what kind of word we are looking for here.
- 11. **Of.** If you keep a record of something, it means that you write down this information because you might need to use it later.
- 12. **Take.** When you take something seriously, you see it as something of great importance. The opposite is 'not to take something seriously (enough)'.
- 13. **Person.** Seeing something in person means seeing it with your own eyes, rather than from a screen or an image.
- 14. **Hearing.** Note that before we have 'having seen', so the next one has to be in the -ing form as well.
- 15. **Therefore/Consequently.** Here, we need a word with the meaning of 'as a result' or 'because of that'. Obviously, only one word can be used in Part 2 of FCE Use of English, so we are left with the two options, mentioned in the answer key.
- 16. **Own.** A contrast is introduced here between having to travel far away and simply observing the birds from your own backyard.
