Answers and explanations

- 9. as. 'To acknowledge as something' means to recognise it, to accept it for what it is.
- 10. **in.** To compete in doing something. 'To compete with' is wrong as it means competing with somebody, and contextually, we talk about the aim of the competition rather than the opponents.
- 11. **not.** A case of using double negative structure is used here: 'NOT UNheard of' means that they actually happen.
- 12. your. If something is not your thing, it means that you do not find it interesting.
- 13. **of.** An admission fee is payment to be allowed to enter some event, e.g. a concert or a competition (as a spectator). 'An admission fee of' is used when you specify how much you have to pay in order to be admitted (to be let inside).
- 14. **however.** An important contrasting element is added using the introductory word 'however', which has to have commas around it as it is located in the middle of the sentence.
- 15. **be.** A common use of passive voice, that requires 'to be' in the correct form.
- 16. **most.** The definite article before the gap indicates that we need to use the superlative form, while the general context points at the word 'most'.
